Hand-Pulled Print Art Exhibit

Currently Grays Harbor College is hosting an art exhibit featuring Handpulled prints. Prints are hand-pulled by an artist from a printmaking surface such as a plate, stone, block or screen. They are usually numbered and signed by the artist beneath the image after the batch, or edition, is printed. After the edition is complete, the printmaking surface is often destroyed, ensuring a rarity that makes the prints more valuable. Even if they are not destroyed, printing wears surfaces down, and images pulled from them begin to degrade. Because of this and the paper type used, each print is unique.

Cara Beth Stevenson who is one of our talented staff members at GHC is pictured here with one of her favorite pieces. She has four of her works displayed in this exhibit. The artwork is displayed at the John Spellman Library here at the college and the show was on display through February 8th.

STARS (Staff Representatives) – acts as the liaison between the classified staff & the president for non-union issues & coordinates community building events, where fellow classified employees can meet & get to know their coworkers. They also welcome the campus community during these functions, as another way to bridge across the board. **CDAC** (Classified Development Advisory Committee) is a resource for classified staff to get professional development opportunities, as the committee hosts the "Classified Retreat," usually in the Spring time, where professional development workshops are offered & they also work to find other opportunities as well.

Kudos to Nancy Leverton, classified staff

who received the "Golden Star Employee of the Quarter" Award. Each quarter, staff are nominated by their colleagues to receive this award based on kindness, integrity, collaboration, creativity or "going the extra mile." After the nominations are collected, the STARS (Staff Representatives) committee reviews, tallies & selects the winner. The committee, along with the president, colleagues & those who nominated the recipient surprise them in their workspace. They receive an award/certificate, picture with the president & an incentive decided by the president to have his parking space for a specified time. During Spring, they also award the "Employee of the Year" award. These are wonderful incentives & recognition for the classified staff, showing how much we are appreciated.

Leadership Development Initiative:

was instituted due to many interests & after reviewing survey results & EDPP's. Libby Wagner is the facilitator. The initial LDI cohort is composed of 37 classified and exempt employees, plus full-time & part-time faculty members who have identified they wanted to participate & were nominated by their vice president.

They have completed two six all-day LDI sessions at the college & are talking about consideration for applying next year.

In light of an incident about

a year ago, North has been working to make it safer for the many employees (staff, faculty, etc.) who ride a bike to campus. Christian Rusby, an exempt employee who had a severe bicycle accident about a year ago, brought a huge awareness to our campus community. The Bicycle Riders here on campus showed their love, care & support, alongside our college community for Christian & they organized a bike-a-thon from here to his house, in his honor of coming home from the hospital. Recently, North has a new PE course: Go By Bike at NSCC taught by Bernie Kay & Josh Miller. This course covers bicycle equipment safety, bicycle handling skills, hazard avoidance maneuvers, rules of the road, traffic law, health & fitness concerns. Study Abroad Information Sessions:

Join us winter quarter to learn about Study Abroad & other WCCCSA programs offered for full-time college credit in a wide variety of countries. Information sessions take place in January, February and March at all three SCCD campuses. Global impact provides international service learning in developing countries, focused on health and development. Participants range in age from 18-80 and include Seattle Community College students/ staff along with people from other institutions and the community at large. We do health clinics, health education and work on infrastructure development such as building and installing clean burning stoves and water filters.

Office Stretches

Boost your energy by stretching tense, tired muscles throughout the workday.

Lower Back Stretch

- Sit forward in your chair.
- Bring one of your knees toward your chest. Use your hands to grab the back of your thigh and gently pull it toward you. Keep your back straight, being careful not to lean forward
- Hold the stretch for 30 seconds. You'll feel tension in your lower back and the part of your buttock.
- Relax and slowly return to the starting position.
- Repeat the stretch with the other leg.

NSCC Named NSF Regional Nanotech Center – NSCC has

been named a National Science Foundation (NSF) Advanced Technological Educational Regional Center for Nanotechnology with a grant of a little under \$3 million to sustain the center for four years. North is the first college in the region to offer a two-year Associate of Applied Science degree in Nanotechnology. The Regional Center is called "Seattle Hub for Industry-driven Nanotechnology Education (SHINE).

Safety & Security

- 3. North has the "Alert System" in place, which sends campus alerts via text & email, should a campus emergency or unplanned closure occur.

Excelling in Teaching & Learning Grant aids ESL students,

thanks to sharing in a \$3.5 million grant from Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. THs State Board for Community & Technical Colleges (SBCTC) announced the Integrated Digital English Acceleration (I-DEA) project grant in December, and North was one of the 10 community & technical colleges selected to benefit in the first year.

A Range of Training Opportunities for Classified Staff


Classified Staff at CCC have had a range of opportunities since last Fall.
